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A proposal to amend
Section 1 of Article IX of the State Constitution to revise requirements relating to class size limitations in public schools and to require that any funds not expended towards the maintenance of average class sizes be applied towards increasing teacher pay to the national average.

Be It Proposed by the Constitution Revision Commission of Florida:

Section 1 of Article IX of the State Constitution is amended to read:

ARTICLE IX
EDUCATION
SECTION 1. Public education.-
(a) The education of children is a fundamental value of the people of the State of Florida. It is, therefore, a paramount duty of the state to make adequate provision for the education of all children residing within its borders. Adequate provision shall be made by law for a uniform, efficient, safe, secure, and high quality system of free public schools that allows students to obtain a high quality education and for the establishment, maintenance, and operation of institutions of higher learning and other public education programs that the needs of the people may require. To assure that children attending public schools obtain a high quality education, the legislature shall make adequate provision to ensure that, by the beginning of the 2010 chol year, there are a sufficient number of classrooms so that within each public school:
(1) The average number of students who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for

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prekindergarten through grade 3 does not exceed 18 students;
(2) The average maximum number of students who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for grades 4 through 8 does not exceed 22 students; and
(3) The average number of students who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for grades 9 through 12 does not exceed 25 students.

The class size requirements of this subsection do not apply to extracurricular, blended learning, or virtual classes. Payment of the costs associated with reducing class size to meet these requirements is the responsibility of the state and not of local schools districts. ginning with the 2003-2004 fiseal yoar, The legislature shall provide sufficient funds to maintain the average number of students in each classeom by at least two students per yutil the maximum number of students per classroom does not exceed the requirements of this subsection. Any funds not spent by districts to maintain the school-level average class size maximums must be spent towards raising teacher pay to the national average.
(b) Every four-year old child in Florida shall be provided by the State a high quality pre-kindergarten learning opportunity in the form of an early childhood development and education program which shall be voluntary, high quality, free, and delivered according to professionally accepted standards. An early childhood development and education program means an organized program designed to address and enhance each child's ability to make age appropriate progress in an appropriate range of settings in the development of language and cognitive

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capabilities and emotional, social, regulatory and moral capacities through education in basic skills and such other skills as the Legislature may determine to be appropriate.
(c) The early childhood education and development programs provided by reason of subsection (b) shall be implemented no later than the beginning of the 2005 school year through funds generated in addition to those used for existing education, health, and development programs. Existing education, health, and development programs are those funded by the State as of January 1, 2002 that provided for child or adult education, health care, or development.

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
