I. SUMMARY:

Currently, s. 27 of Art. X of the Florida Constitution provides that fifteen percent of the funds paid to the state of Florida for the tobacco settlement are to be used for a statewide tobacco education and prevention program.

The proposal revises s. 27 of Art. X of the Florida Constitution to require that twenty percent of the fifteen percent received from the tobacco settlement for tobacco prevention be used for purposes related to the research and treatment of cancer.

Based on estimates of s.27, Art X funds from the Office of Economic and Demographic Research, the amounts dedicated to research and treatment equate to the following:

- FY19-20: \$14.3 million
- FY20-21: \$14.6 million
- FY21-22: \$15.0 million
- FY22-23: \$15.2 million

The proposal provides that the funds shall be distributed evenly between competitive cancer research projects that are administered by the biomedical research advisory council. After consultation with the biomedical research advisory council, the state surgeon general shall award the grants.

II. SUBSTANTIVE ANALYSIS:

A. PRESENT SITUATION:

Florida Tobacco Settlement

In August 1997, tobacco companies (Phillip Morris, Inc., R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Company, Brown & Williamson Tobacco Corp., and Lorillard Tobacco Company) entered into a multi-billion dollar tobacco settlement agreement with Florida for all past, present and future claims by the state, including reimbursement of Medicaid expenses, fraud, RICO, and punitive damages.¹ In November 2006, Florida's voters approved a state Constitutional amendment, creating Article X, Section 27, calling for a comprehensive tobacco education and use prevention program.²

Comprehensive Statewide Tobacco Education and Prevention Program

Section 381.84, F.S, provides that the Department of Health (DOH), through the Bureau of Tobacco Free Florida (BTFF), administers the statewide tobacco education and use prevention program outlined in s. 27 of Art. X of the Florida Constitution. The statute requires BTFF's programs to focus on tobacco use by youth and specifies the primary goals of the program are to "reduce the prevalence of tobacco use among youth, adults, and pregnant women; reduce per capita tobacco consumption; and reduce exposure to environmental tobacco smoke, and enforcing the "Florida Clean Indoor Air Act". As directed by statute, BTFF organizes and administers the program in accordance with the CDC Best Practices for Comprehensive Tobacco Control Programs, with a "focus on educating people, particularly youth and their parents, about the health hazards of tobacco and discouraging the use of tobacco."

Funding From the Tobacco Settlement

Section 27(b) of Article X of the Florida Constitution, directs the legislature to appropriate 15 percent of the funds paid to the state in 2005 under the tobacco settlement for the statewide tobacco education and use prevention program.³ The legislature appropriates the remaining 85% of the annual tobacco settlement trust fund amount to programs outside of BTFF.

The following are the funds appropriated for FY16-17 and FY17-18 and estimates for the next years:

• FY16-17: \$66.3 million

- FY18-19: \$70.3 million
- FY19-20: \$71.5 million
- FY20-21: \$73.0 million
- FY21-22: \$75.1 million
- FY22-23: \$77.1 million⁴

Section 27(a)(1) of Article X also requires that one third of the total appropriation be used for an advertising campaign to discourage the use of tobacco.⁵

B. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

The proposal revises s. 27 of Art. X of the Florida Constitution to require that twenty percent of the fifteen percent received from the tobacco settlement be used for purposes related to the research and treatment of cancer.

Based on estimates of s.27, Art X funds from the Office of Economic and Demographic Research, the amounts dedicated to research and treatment equate to the following:

- FY19-20: \$14.3 million
- FY20-21: \$14.6 million
- FY21-22: \$15.0 million
- FY22-23: \$15.2 million⁶

The proposal provides that the funds shall be distributed evenly between competitive cancer research projects that are administered by the biomedical research advisory council.⁷ After consultation with the biomedical research advisory council, the state surgeon general shall award the grants.

C. FISCAL IMPACT:

The following fiscal impact was provided by the Florida Department of Health at the request of Constitution Revision Commission staff:⁸

Redirecting funding from the tobacco education and use prevention program toward the research and treatment of cancer would require reductions to community-based tobacco prevention programs, including youth and young adult initiatives, health education

communications efforts, cessation programs currently available to Florida's citizens trying to quit smoking, statewide health behavior surveillance and evaluative systems. Reductions to tobacco program area funding would likely result in setbacks in progress towards DOH's Long Range Program Plan (LRPP) components of "Readiness for Emerging Health Threats" and the DOH and State Health Improvement Plan (SHIP) strategic priority of reducing statewide inhaled nicotine prevalence among youth and adults.⁹ In addition, economic modeling from BTFF's independent external evaluator demonstrates redirecting current funding from tobacco education and use prevention to cancer research would significantly increase health care costs to Florida citizens and to the state, including to Medicaid. Conservative projections indicate a 20% redirect in funding could equate to \$1.9 billion increased in personal health care costs (including \$.5 billion to Medicaid), a moderate estimate could equate to \$3.9 billion in increased costs (\$.9 billion to Medicaid), and maximum estimate of \$21.4 billion (\$4.5 billion to Medicaid) in increased costs from 2019-2028.¹⁰

SECTION 27. Comprehensive Statewide Tobacco Education And Prevention Program.—In order to protect people, especially youth, from health hazards of using tobacco, including addictive disorders, cancer, cardiovascular diseases, and lung diseases;

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and to discourage use of tobacco, particularly among youth, a portion of the money that tobacco companies pay to the State of Florida under the Tobacco Settlement each year shall be used to fund a comprehensive statewide tobacco education and prevention program consistent with recommendations of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), as follows:

(5) Publicly-reported annual evaluations to ensure that moneys appropriated pursuant to this section are spent properly, which shall include evaluation of the program's effectiveness in reducing and preventing tobacco use, and annual recommendations for improvements to enhance the program's effectiveness, which are to include comparisons to similar programs proven to be effective in other states, as well as comparisons to CDC *Best Practices*, including amendments thereto.

(6) Research of Cancer. Funds appropriated shall be distributed evenly between competitive cancer research projects that are administered by the biomedical research advisory council. After consultation with the biomedical research advisory council, the state surgeon general shall award the grants.

(b) FUNDING.

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Creating a Healthier Washington County

Mission: We are working with community organizations and leaders committed to educating others about tobacco use, helping protect kids from tobacco, and strengthening local policies, especially those that protect the public from secondhand smoke.

Progress: In 2016 locally only 6.2% of 11-17 year old students (combination middle and high) reported using smokeless tobacco in the last 30 days down from 9.1% in 2014. Additionally, current cigarette smoking in the last 30 days has decreased from 34.6% in 2014 to 28.9% in 2016. So we are making progress.

Challenges: Smokeless Tobacco rates in Washington County are still higher than the state average and Electronic (E-Cig) use is steadily increasing.

Statewide Impact: While smoking in Florida is low, overall, there are geographic and demographic inequalities across the state, as seen in the 2017 County Health Rankings & Roadmaps report released earlier this year. The report, which is a collaboration between the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute, looks at a variety of measures that can affect the health and future of communities, such as rates of smoking. Many of Florida's rural counties had significantly higher smoking rates than the statewide average (15.8 percent).

- Gadsden, Hardee, Madison, Okeechobee, Union 21 percent
- DeSoto, Hamilton, Hendry, Holmes, Liberty, Putnam, Suwannee 20 percent
- Baker, Calhoun, Dixie, Jackson, Lafayette, Washington 19 percent

Policy Efforts:

Smokeless Tobacco: Encourage our County and Cities to NOT allow free sampling and distribution of smokeless tobacco at community events like the Watermelon Festival and other family friendly events.

Point of Sale (Retail Advertising/Marketing): Bring awareness on the advertising and marketing tactics targeting children and youth. In a lot of stores tobacco marketing consists of candy flavors, bright color packages and is below door handle levels "eye level is buy level".

Worksite Wellness: Helping businesses create and enhance policies that support Tobacco Free Grounds, Increasing Cessation Health Insurance Benefits and Providing Tobacco Free Florida Cessation Information for employees and their families. We also work with business to provide quarterly information of a variety of health topics to support workplace wellness.

Smoke-Free Housing: We are working with our local housing authority to implement a policy.

Secondhand Smoke: We are gaining support from the community to assure our parks and sporting complexes are tobacco free in order to reduce exposure to secondhand smoke.

New Work Area's: Electronic Devices including Vaper Cigarettes, E-Cigs and Hookah's.

I. SUMMARY:

The Florida Constitution grants broad protection for an owner of a homestead from forced sale or liens by creditors. This is commonly known as homestead exemption protection.

The proposal removes the homestead exemption protection from creditor claims if a creditor:

- Establishes in an action against the owner of the homestead that the creditor's funds were fraudulently used by the owner to acquire or improve the homestead; or
- Obtains a judgment against the owner of the homestead for damages caused by an intentional tort or intentional criminal or fraudulent act by the owner of the homestead, so long as the homestead was not the primary residence for the owner's spouse or minor child when the tort or act occurred or at the time of the judgment in the action.

II. SUBSTANTIVE ANALYSIS:

A. PRESENT SITUATION:

Florida Homestead Exemption

Section 4 of Article X of the Florida Constitution provides an exemption from forced sale of a natural person's homestead. A homestead includes:

- If located outside a municipality, one hundred sixty acres of contiguous land and improvements; or
- If located within a municipality, one half-acre of contiguous land, upon which the exemption shall be limited to the residence of the owner or the owner's family; and
- Personal property up to the value of one thousand dollars.

There are several exceptions to the homestead exemption, including:

- Payment of taxes and assessments;
- Obligations contracted for the purchase, improvement or repair; and
- Obligations contracted for house, field or other labor performed on the realty.

Historically, courts have liberally construed the homestead exemption in favor of the owner, including protecting the homestead from civil and criminal forfeiture,¹ and when the homestead was acquired with funds from illicit proceeds.² Courts have also provided that homesteads are shielded from creditors when non-exempt funds were used to purchase the homestead with the specific intent of hindering, delaying, or defrauding creditors.³ However, Florida courts have held that a homestead purchased with the proceeds of fraud may be subject to an equitable lien in limited circumstances.⁴

Florida has several prominent examples of public figures embroiled in scandal shielding themselves from creditors by using the homestead exemption.⁵ These include white collar crimes,⁶ and sexual harassment lawsuits.⁷ In a recent case in Walton County, a woman was shot in the face by a former intimate partner and nearly died.⁸ The defendant in the case was unemployed, and his only asset was a home he had inherited from a deceased

relative. The defendant was judgment proof, leaving the victim with mounting medical bills and no recourse.⁹

B. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

The proposal removes the homestead exemption protection from creditor claims if a creditor:

- Establishes in an action against the owner of the homestead that the creditor's funds were fraudulently used by the owner to acquire or improve the homestead; or
- Obtains a judgment against the owner of the homestead for damages caused by an intentional tort or intentional criminal or fraudulent act by the owner of the homestead, so long as the homestead was not the primary residence for the owner's spouse or minor child when the tort or act occurred or at the time of the judgment in the action.

The proposal requires the creditor to take affirmative steps to establish certain conditions for the owner of the homestead to lose the protection of the homestead exemption.

The amended proposal requires a creditor to do the following in order for an owner to lose homestead exemption protection:

- Obtain a judgment against the owner of the homestead for damages caused by an intentional tort or intentional criminal or fraudulent act by the owner of the homestead, so long as the homestead was not the primary residence for the owner's spouse or minor child when the tor or act occurred or at the time of the judgment in the action.¹⁰
